

## Leading International School Offers Unique Gap Year Experience to Students

*If looking for tigers, climbing a Himalayan peak or sharing a meal with Buddhist monks sounds better than being cooped up in class, let the dream become a reality...*

American students are being offered a once in a lifetime opportunity to spend a semester studying in the Himalaya thanks to Woodstock School, India's longest established international education facility.

The gap semester is open to students between the ages of 18 and 25. The first semester for participation will run from August 11 to November 28 2010 followed by the second semester from February 16 to June 5 2011.

As part of the experience, attendees will study Indian culture, learn to communicate in Hindi, trek up snow peaks in Garhwal, explore the picturesque settlements of Kaza, stumble across millennia-old monasteries, spot tigers in Corbett National Park and go white-water rafting on the Ganges.

Personal and physical skill development includes service-learning projects and home stays in Himalayan villages, advanced first aid, basic mountaineering and introductory rafting, wildlife safari and an introduction to human-animal conflict.

According to alumni coordinator Chris Starr, "The Gap Semester is a once in a lifetime opportunity. Students are being given a window to a truly unique world, exposing them to environments, skills and situations that will stay with them throughout their adult life. At the same time, they will be familiarising themselves with one of the world's major and rising economies – a great asset for future global players."

The Gap Semester is based at the Hanifl Centre, the home of Woodstock's outdoor education and environmental study programme.
